Sport Funding Report: 2017/18

Funding

During October 2017 the Department of Education (DfE) increased the Sports Premium funding. The new allocation is based on a lump sum of £16,000 plus £10 for each child.

Warren Primary Academy will receive £17,830. £8,915 of this will be used in school and £8,915 will be held centrally by LEAD.

The DfE have outlined 5 key indicators that schools should expect to see improvement in if the funding is used in the correct way.

- There should be regular engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity – the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all young people aged 5-18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school.
- The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement.
- There should be a boost in confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport.
- Children should experience a broader range of sports and activities.
- There should be an increased participation in competitive sport.

Warren Primary Academy will ensure that the above 5 points are met through:

- personalised clubs
- a wide variety of curriculum and club activities
- high quality coaching and training for CPD of staff
- the investment of the REAL PE program which provides training and resources for high quality lesson planning and delivery
- the introduction of new sports and dance into the curriculum and clubs and extended swimming provision.
- ensuring Warren Primary Academy offers opportunities for pupils to develop the knowledge and understanding of what makes a healthy lifestyle
- forging links with the local community to enrich the P.E. provision within school.
- continuing to provide opportunities for children to represent the school in sport competitions

Through all of this, Warren Primary is building and improving sustainable provision that will benefit pupils in the future as well as now.

Funding will NOT be used to cover teachers planning, preparation and assessment (PPA) time or to just fulfil the teaching of core national curriculum requirements – including swimming.



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Ice skating £1,000

Ice skating was a successful use of some of the premium last year and has been participated in again this year. Year 6 children experienced a half term of lessons once a week and had the opportunity to experience a new sport that is local to their community, develop core strength, balance, agility and resilience. Children are taught by qualified ice skating teachers in the Nottingham ice arena.

REAL PE £1,924

The REAL PE programme has been invested in by the school. This will ensure that all staff are trained in delivering high quality lessons based on skill and strength development and is a sustainable investment for future students in the school. It will be expected that staff will teach one lesson of REAL PE a week and the other lesson will be coach led. All lesson resources and plans are provided with full levels of differentiation and inclusion strategies allowing teachers to know exactly how to deliver an effective lesson that will allow all to make progress.

Premier sport coaching £6,288

Premier sport will be delivering one and a half days of PE in the school. This allows all children to have one coach led lesson in which they will practice skills developed through a variety of sports, games and dance. Teachers will also take part in lessons and learn from the coaches. This is excellent CPD that they can then carry forward in the future. The sessions also include 3 assessment days that will allow progress in fitness to be demonstrated. Each block of sessions with each year group also ends with an impact report that shows the impact the sessions have had on the children. There will also be two afterschool clubs running – fencing and dance. This will give the children the opportunity to experience a new sport and practice the skills they are learning in lessons in a new way. Dance club will take place for one half term and fencing will run throughout the whole year. Different year groups will be offered this club each half term so that all children are able to access the experience. All lessons and clubs will be high quality and provide the best to allow all children to make progress. They will be practicing core skills whilst learning about different sports and games. They will be developing a vast amount of skills such as core strength, stamina, resilience, sportsmanship, agility, teamwork, self-discipline and the passion to continue onto a specific sport of interest as they develop and move on to secondary school.

Swimming £6,617

None of the sports premium budget is used to pay for swimming. Year 4 and 5 children attend a one hour swimming session per week for the whole of the Autumn term. At the end of the block the children are assessed. Those children who are in year 5 that do not meet the 25m swimming target then go swimming again the following year in year 6 for booster sessions to get them to the desired point. This should mean that by the end of year 6 all children will have met the 25m national curriculum target.

Year 3 have lessons for an hour a week for a half term to prepare them for the Autumn term when they are in year four. The idea behind this is for them to be acquainted with the water and feel more confident in year 4 so that they can focus on developing their swimming from earlier on in the sessions. This arrangement has been adapted this year as in the previous year's children have only had 30 minute sessions for one half term. We hope to see swimming having a bigger impact and a larger number of children gaining their 25m target with this new arrangement.
