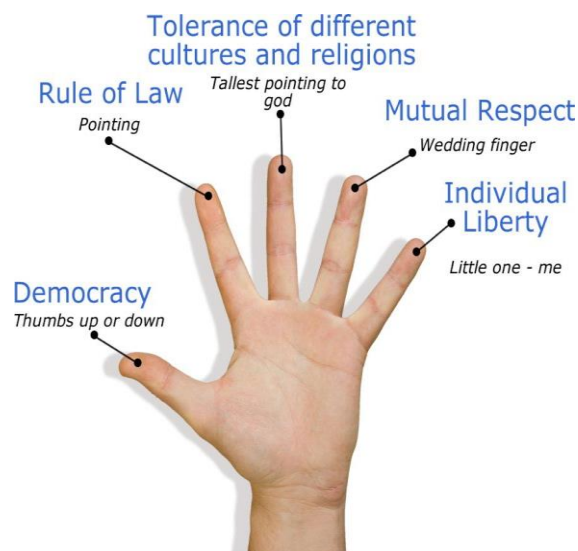


A message from our Head of School

British Values at Warren Academy



A fundamental part of personal development to support all children to develop spiritual, moral social and cultural understand at Warren Academy is understanding the 5 British Values. The image above shows how we teach the children to remember these values and to live them out every day.

The British Value of 'Tolerance of Different Cultures and Religions' is something we have lived out across our school community over the last two weeks, through the celebration of different cultural events in school.



Mrs Sultana, our Religious Education leader, celebrated the festival of Holi with the children in assembly on Tuesday. This festival is known as the festival of colour, and it is tradition for Hindus to smear bright colours on friends and family, and offer prayers for one another.

Attendance matters

Attendance processes if your child is absent from school

- All parents and carers are expected to notify school if your child is unable to attend and give reason as to why they are absent.

If your child's attendance is above 90%

- If we do not receive communication from you, a text message will be sent to find out why your child is absent.
- If your child is well enough to attend in the afternoon, we encourage you to bring your child in, as they will receive an attendance mark for the afternoon session.
- We expect for you to continue to communicate with school on a daily basis if your child continues to be absent from school.
- If we do not receive communication from you, a house visit will be completed.

If your child's attendance is below 90% - persistently absent

- If we do not receive communication from you, school will phone you by 9.30am to find out why your child is absent.
- Medical evidence, if your child is absent from school as they are unwell, will be requested from you.
- If medical evidence is not provided to school for your child's absence, we will complete a house visit to discuss your child's absence with you.
- If 3 home visits are made in a term, school will need to consider whether a referral to social services is required due to educational neglect.

Lateness and unauthorised absence

- There has been a significant increase in the number of children that are arriving late to school.
- All children should arrive at school by 8.50am.
- If your child arrives past 9.30am, their attendance for the morning session will be classed as unauthorised, and this will negatively impact their attendance.
- You can receive a fine from the local authority for continued lateness past 9.30am, as this is considered to be unauthorised absence from school.

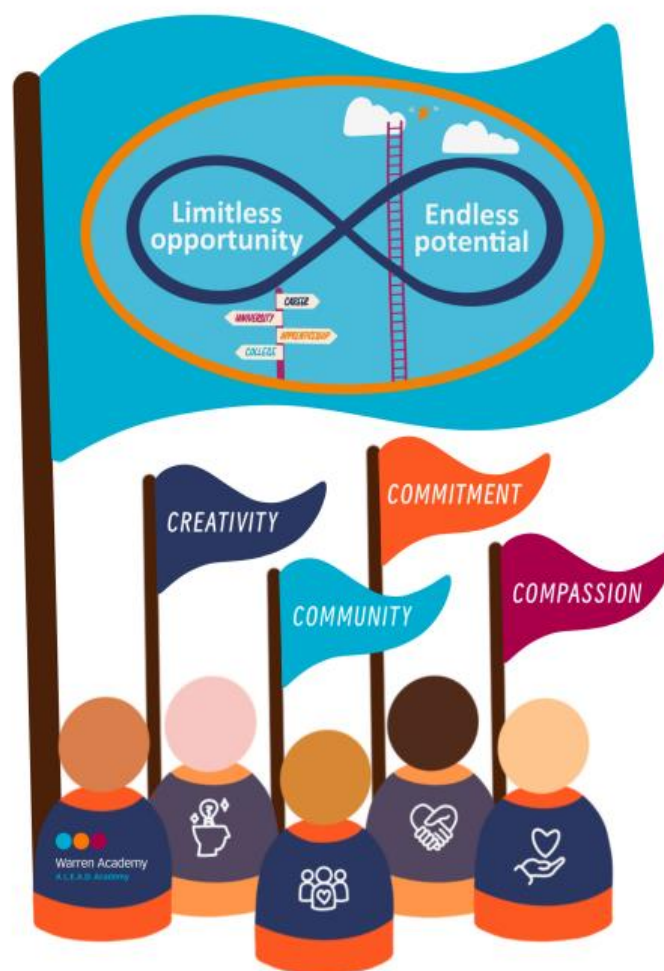




Update from Mrs Salam



In response to our parents and carers Trust survey, we wanted to share further information with you about what Personal Development looks like at Warren. We define Personal Development in 4 areas – Spiritual, Moral, Social and Moral. These are defined as:

- **Spiritual -**
Explore beliefs and experience; respect values; discover oneself and the surrounding world; use imagination and creativity; reflect on experiences
- **Moral -**
The opportunity to learn what is right and wrong, and respect the law; understand consequences; investigate moral and ethical issues and offer reasoned views.
- **Social -**
The opportunity to use a range of social skills to participate in the local community and beyond; appreciate diverse viewpoints; participate, volunteer and cooperate; resolve conflict
- **Cultural -**
The opportunity to explore and appreciate cultural influences; appreciate the role of Britain's parliamentary system; participate in cultural opportunities; understand, accept, respect and celebrate diversity.

Safeguarding news

An update from Mrs Ford, Designated Safeguarding Lead



At Warren Primary Academy we follow Jigsaw PSHE:

What is Jigsaw PSHE?

Jigsaw PSHE is a comprehensive and completely original Scheme of Work for the whole Primary School from Nursery through to Year 6. It brings together PSHE Education, emotional literacy, social skills and spiritual development in a comprehensive scheme of learning. The statutory guidance for Relationships and Health Education for primary schools is also covered within this scheme. All of these pieces of learning are brought together to form a cohesive picture, helping children to know and value who they are and understand how they relate to other people in the world.

Our Jigsaw PSHE curriculum covers all areas of Safeguarding through each of the strands to a different degree. We are sensitive in our teaching and recognise that some more sensitive subjects need to be taught at an age-appropriate level, or as a small group or 1:1 level where a more urgent need arises.

We challenge children to think deeply about safeguarding matters and their own personal, physical and mental wellbeing. We value pupils' questions and give them space for their own thoughts, ideas, and concerns.

We give pupils' opportunities across the curriculum to explore values, personal rights, responsibilities, and equal opportunities that develop moral concepts that impact positively on safeguarding, promote British values and prevent radicalisation and extremism. There are many opportunities throughout our learning in school to explore safeguarding issues.

Practical safeguarding opportunities are also planned into the curriculum.






For example:

- Road safety (including out of school visits, bike-ability, work with police officers in the community)
- Poolside and water safety through swimming lessons.
- Fire awareness (including visits from the local fire service)
- Visits to school from medical staff.
- Visitors from charities such as NSPCC, the dogs trust to do focused projects
- Online safety quizzes and training
- Our visits and experiences incorporate "Stranger Danger", being safe in the outdoors, what to do if??
- Safe use of technology including password security and privacy settings.

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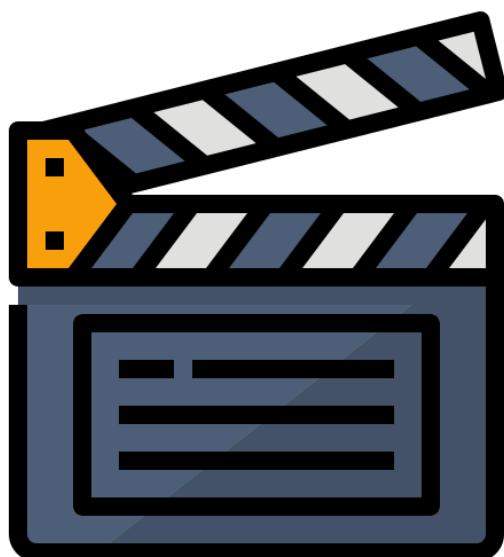

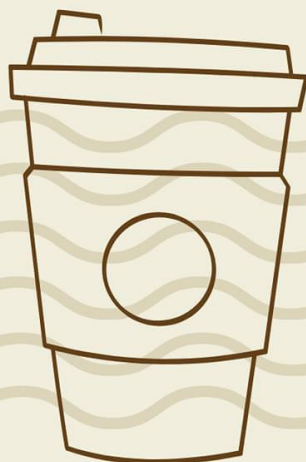
